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When I was younger, I enjoyed stacking layers of Lego blocks to make a house. I remember putting my masterpieces on display and making sure that nobody touched them. I have always been thrilled by the ecstasy of accomplishing something with my own hands.

After high school, it dawned on me that I had the capacity to shape my own life. This time, I wouldn't be using Lego blocks to build a house—rather, my choices would form my future. I recall writing my plans on a piece of paper, and whew! It was grand. It makes me giggle every time I remember it.

When I finished college, I was giddy to take the next steps in my blueprint. However, God had a proposal: I would give Him the pieces—my time and my decisions—and He would build my life—my career, and my destiny. It shook me to the core, the thought of giving up the control, but I conceded. After all, I can't do any better than the Master Builder. "For we are God's masterpiece, created in the Messiah Jesus to perform good actions that God prepared long ago to be our way of life." (Ephesians 2:10 ISV)

From Resistance to Redemption

was already practicing some Biblical principles before the Prophecy Seminar — mostly because of my husband, who is a devoted Seventh-day Adventist. For seven years, I attended the Manalac SDA Church every Sabbath with my family. But while my body was present in the pews, my heart remained distant.

From the first night I attended, I felt something different. The moment I listened, I sensed the

After my baptism, I am committed to sharing the truth I have found with others—my family, my friends, my neighbors, and even my colleagues. I want them to experience the same love, forgiveness, and salvation I have received. I want others to see that no matter how resistant someone may be, God's love can still reach them—just like it reached me.

I thank God for my husband and for the ministry of Amazing Facts. My story is proof that God never stops calling. And when we finally say yes, He meets us with open arms—ready to transform, to restore, and to renew.

used to be a nominal Adventist—someone who went to church once a month, sat through the sermon, and left right after without any real connection to God. But everything changed after I graduated from high school.

The unfolding...

I went to visit my mother, who was working in a place managed by a missionary pastor. What I thought would be a simple visit became a turning point in my life. There, morning and evening worships opened my eyes to the beauty of spending time with God. I found myself longing to know more about Him and see His plan for me.

His redirection...

A few months later, I was sent to LIGHT (Lay Institute for Global Health Training) with three of my friends. My relationship with God grew deeper, and my lifestyle began to reflect the transformation happening in my heart. I stayed

there for almost two years before enrolling at PAFCOE.

During those years, my mother passed away from breast cancer. I was full of questions. "Lord, why didn't You heal her?" I asked. But God, in His grace, met me in my grief and pain through the PAFCOE training. I began to see that He had a purpose—even in her passing. I did not understand it all, but I finally had peace. At PAFCOE, my understanding of our doctrines deepened, and I became more equipped to serve.

Following along...

Drawn back...

However, along the way, I was drawn back to my initial plan—I was only going to do missionary work for a while, then go back to college, finish my degree, and find a job. And so, after my Bible work, I returned to our province, finished my studies, and eventually worked as a teacher in a private school. But after some years, I felt exhausted by the routine. I was ready for a change. I missed working for the Lord—meeting people and giving winsome Bible studies.

Reminiscing...

I could still recall my precious experiences as a first-time Bible worker. I was terrified. Many times, people hid when they saw me coming. Some outright rejected me while I was talking. I walked the streets crying, wondering why I had ever accepted this work. I felt so incapable and unqualified.

Moreover, our site was in a squatter area where many people used drugs. There were days when gunfire erupted between addicts and police. It was so dangerous and challenging. We often ran in the barangay hall for safety. My partner was nearly stabbed by an addict who mistook him for a police spy.

However, the more I meditated on God's mercy and patience toward me, the more I learned to

extend that same mercy to others. One evening during worship, someone reminded us to pray for divine appointments. So I did—not just at night, but all throughout the day while I walked. And eventually, things started to change.

One day at the market, I was interviewing a vendor when a lady interrupted. I did not answer her right away because I was focused on the vendor. After being rejected again, I was about to walk away when the lady asked once more, "What was that about?" So, I interviewed her instead. That short conversation led to a consistent Bible study schedule. Praise the Lord! She told me she had read the Bible before but never understood it the way she did during our studies. Sometimes she cried while studying, overwhelmed by the truth she was receiving. And every time we studied, I felt like I was the one being more blessed. My faith grew stronger because of that experience. I have learned that if I simply listen and submit, God will lead me to His divine appointments. Eventually, that woman followed the voice of Jesus and was baptized.

It is true—sometimes God leads us to places we never planned to go or gives us tasks we never planned to do. But when we surrender to His will, we begin to see why He brought us there.







Rekindled..

Reminiscing on my wonderful experiences with the Lord, I prayed again for His guidance in my life. I knew I could never go wrong doing His will. I wanted to surrender my plans for His plans. Yes, I could apply for a high-paying job. Yes, I could live a more comfortable life. But, I knew I would not have peace doing anything else. From that moment on, I resolved that wherever I go, soul-winning must be my first and foremost work.

So, I peacefully quit my job and joined my missionary friends in volunteer Bible work, not knowing that God had a distinct calling prepared for me. Then PAFCOE called me to work with them. I thought I would be assigned to the kitchen or other staff work. But to my surprise, I was asked to teach Bible Doctrines and Daniel-Revelation to the trainees. I learned...

In this journey, I have learned to trust God wholeheartedly. His ways are higher. His timing is perfect. Prayer has become my lifeline—my strength. I have learned not to lean on my own understanding but to acknowledge Him in everything, and He truly does direct my path.

Jesus is coming soon. Time is short. We cannot waste our lives chasing things that will not last. What keeps me going? God's promises. David once said, "I have never seen the righteous forsaken nor his seed begging bread." I hold on to that. I do not know what the future holds, but I know the One who holds it.

To anyone reading this who may be facing uncertainties: trust God and seek to do His will first. His plans are better than yours. And if you are discouraged, fix your eyes on Jesus.
